Comments from the Chair of the Pastoral Council

March 20, 2022

The year 2021 will be remembered as something of a roller-coaster.

The spring and summer brought relief from the restrictions of the pandemic, as Covid-19 seemed to be retreating after months of creating havoc with our physical, mental, and social lives. September saw the return of the Regina Symphony Orchestra performances in our church, the cathedral choir back in the loft, our Sunday Masses averaging 100 parishioners in attendance at each one. There were gatherings once more for weddings, baptisms, and funerals.

Then another lock-down came in December.

However, our resilience saw us through the ups and downs, as you will see in the reports from our various parish sectors. The Building and Grounds committee, mainly through the generosity of volunteers, continued its management of construction and maintenance projects to ensure we are kept safe, secure, and warm in our church and that this 110-year-old structure remains standing. The Pastoral and Finance Councils continued to meet regularly, masked and distanced in the auditorium, to make sure Fr. Dan had the help he needed to administer the work and finances of the parish.

Last spring, Fr. Dan and the Councils agreed to allow the Cathedral Neighbourhood organization to erect a Community Fridge on our parking lot. This fills an important need in the area and keeps us all aware of the needs of others. On that same theme, our very active Social Justice representative, Bernadette, has managed to raise more than half of what is required to reunite a Syrian refugee family with siblings and parents in Regina. The money came from outright donations and various fund-raising projects: yard work, odd jobs, picking up recyclables, charging for parking on HRC lots during Roughrider games. Her efforts are ongoing.

And most importantly, our loyal parishioners, whether attending Mass or staying cautious at home, continued with their generous donations so we could pay our bills and keep the lights on.

We also had to deal with a significant change. We were sorry to see Tanya Bergen leave her position as Director of Music at the end of July, after five years of diligence, loyalty, and wonderful musicianship. Her creativity was most evident through the first year and a half of the pandemic, as she continued to enhance our liturgies and services without the help of a choir. Her final gift to us was organizing and helping in the major cleaning of our pipe organ, an over-due necessity in maintaining this treasured instrument. Over 3100 pipes (yes - 3100+!) had to be removed and cleaned of bat-dung and dirt, which had been gathering for more than 25 years, and each one retuned. The work, which took three weeks in July and a team that included a Casavant technician from Calgary, cost \$26K. Thanks to a few donors, one of whom donated most of what was needed, the bill was paid. The job need not be done for another 25 years!

We are most grateful to Tanya for her service at HRC and wish her well in the next chapter of her professional life.

After a diligent search, we hired Evanne Wilhelm to take over Tanya's position. She brings with her years of experience as a choral director and music teacher in the schools. Her main challenge at the moment is attracting singers to the main choir, which had shrunk in numbers because of the pandemic. She sees an important part of her ministry as tapping into the various musical talents among our parishioners and highlighting the cathedral as the mother church of the archdiocese. To that effect, she will be inviting choirs from the Catholic high schools to sing on occasion at our Masses in order to introduce young people to the cathedral. Her vision and creativity will serve us well.

A highlight of the year was our celebrating, without fanfare, Fr. Dan's 35th anniversary of ordination into the priesthood. Though unable to "party" because of the pandemic, parishioners had a chance to show their affection and gratitude to Fr. Dan by presenting him with a handsome cheque. If all is well this coming summer, we might still organize that long-promised BBQ.

There are not enough words to thank all the men and women of this parish who give of their time and expertise to keep us together as a community, whether it be to serve at Mass as lectors or eucharistic ministers or singers or ushers, to remove the snow so we can enter the church safely, to put up lights or attend to the boilers or keep the church clean. And there are those who serve on the Councils, those who take care of technological matters in the office, those who never hesitate to help with whatever issues need resolving -- so many whom we sometimes take for granted. Our parish is richly blessed with its generous volunteers.

Barring another surge of the pandemic, the RSO will perform in the cathedral from March through May, the choir will return to the loft at the start of Lent, and we might see more parishioners at our liturgies. Let us hope and pray that the roller-coaster comes to a halt in 2022 and we return to stable ground.

The Rebuilding Our Church Capital Campaign

2021 was a challenging year for the Campaign.

We worked as usual until June; then, the news of the unmarked graves at the Residential School in Kamloops was released, followed by similar news from Cowessess and other Residential School sites. This, combined with a strong public calling that the Church prioritize funding for Residential School Survivors and reconciliation/healing initiatives, resulted in our second suspension of new donor meetings since the pandemic hit in 2020.

In order to assist our archdiocese with Indigenous reconciliation, we added a "Healing and Reconciliation Opportunity" to the Campaign. Our team contacted those who had already donated or pledged to the campaign to let them know that if they chose, they could redirect a percentage of (or top-up) their campaign gifts to the archdiocese's TRC Healing Response Fund.*

In the meantime, our Campaign Cabinet worked on behind-the-scenes planning, as well as on preparation for when the time would be right to restart conversations with potential donors about the campaign. Our hope is that these conversations can begin sometime after the Indigenous Delegation to Rome.

Meanwhile, the Project Steering Committee and Working Group have been planning intensely also. We are hopeful that the funds received so far will help with the most urgent restorations to our beloved cathedral.

We ask for your continued prayers for the success of this project and for engagement and generosity in our parish and all through our archdiocese.

Report for 2022 AGM - Building and Grounds Committee

Along with overseeing the routine snow clearing, lawn cutting, draining of the parking lot after rains, replacing burned out lights, etc., the Building and Grounds Committee was active with the following:

- Brian's and Ray's efforts, on behalf of the parish, to apply for a Workplace Accessibility Grant from the federal government for just over \$80,000 was successful! This is for wheelchair lifts to the lower altar area and also up to the sacristy level. The work also includes automatic door operators and renovations to the washroom behind the sacristy to make it wheelchair accessible.
- The east exterior stair was finally replaced in spring/summer. We have been trying to "baby" the new concrete by not placing ice melt salts on it, using sand instead.
- Jim is ready to install the 8 new windows into the west tower. The east side has been completed. Windows are being painted, so when the weather turns nicer, we can get a good start on this not-so-small endeavour.
- Rob has been a liaison person with the community fridge folks. Greg put a lot of effort into obtaining donated material and installation for the electrical supply and coordinated the installation with minimal disruption to the parking lot.
- Shrubs close to the building and old tree roots were removed from the west side of the building. Late in the fall, the ground was reshaped to provide a slope away from the building, and a layer of yellow clay was packed in next to the foundation. We will install concrete pavers in the spring and plant some grass seed. To water the grass, a new water line will be run to provide an outside tap on that side of the building.
- Walters Mechanical provided some much-needed maintenance on the boilers and were there over several days troubleshooting and installing new gas valves. Temperatures were pretty cool in the church, but we didn't have any burst pipes. Jim oversaw that effort.

- We continue to pick away at risk management recommendations. New energy-efficient LED lights were installed around the exterior of the building to keep entrances and grounds lit up. They are on photosensors, so there is no more going around the building, turning on and off exterior lights. The main entrance globe lights on the building were put on timers and new brighter, efficient LED bulbs in those.
- Jim and Rob tried but were unsuccessful in dealing with the large wasp nest at the highlevel roof. Access is the biggest hurdle as the nest is 55 feet up from the ground. Plan B is to try from the attic while temperatures are still cool.
- We have attempted to resolve ongoing issues with heating in the rectory. Things seem to have improved a bit this year. We'll keep plugging away at that and other plumbing issues that come up from time to time in the rectory.
- Rob installed a CCTV camera system with help from others. This is to assist with reviewing alarm situations that occur.
- Conrado, our maintenance personnel, took another job opportunity around mid-year, so we are currently without a permanent maintenance person. Jim and Rob have been more involved than usual with snow and lights. Carla has been doing a super job of keeping up with the routine cleaning.

Thanks to all the time and effort put in by the Building and Grounds Committee members over the past year, as always.

Capital Projects Planned for 2022

Planning for a capital project in 2022 will focus on the Workplace Accessibility Grant work. This has to be detailed, tendered, and installed. We hope this can be done before next Christmas (no promises).

The total estimated for capital projects for 2022 is \$124,374, of which \$81,374 is from the federal government grant.

- 4. Christmas Lantern Fund Raising -- sold five lanterns @ \$100 each; profit went to fund other projects, like the Light a tree this Christmas in December.
- 5. Helped put up the Christmas lights on the trees outside the cathedral.
- 6. Helped put up the Christmas trees and manger inside the cathedral.

The council is still struggling to encourage membership participation to support the council in its activities for the church and community. With the full support and encouragement from our Chaplain, Rev Danilo Rafael, we hope and pray that our council will survive and get back on its feet again.

- Gas card/tank fill-up re getting to a new job in Saskatoon
- Prescription costs help
- Community fridge commitment of \$100 per month
- Christmas hampers helped 61 individuals.

We were fortunate to welcome a new member, Noel, a U of R student from Winnipeg who was part of SSVP in Winnipeg. We also had a wonderful presentation by Ann Perry, the Executive Director of Circle Project. Her address opened our eyes to the work of the Circle Project being done in a very quiet, meaningful manner.

Our Christmas Hamper project included manning a table at the main entrance of the Cathedral for three consecutive Sundays at each of the Masses. This proved beneficial as the donations increased from just over \$500 in 2020 to \$1355 in 2021.

Our group continues to be ceaselessly grateful for the continued support of the parishioners of Holy Rosary. "Thank you" hardly seems a sufficient response for the financial help of our parishioners.

2021 Report from the Director of Music

This past Spring, the Holy Rosary Cathedral Music Ministry began its transition from a successful 5-year term under the leadership of Director Tanya Bergen to me. In June of 2021, I was hired and officially became Director of Music at Holy Rosary Cathedral on August 1, 2021. I was able to move into my new role with the kind and gracious help of many of the people of the parish. I would like to specifically recognize the assistance of Samira McCarthy, Ana Harris, Father Danilo Rafael, and Tanya Bergen.

Throughout August, I made efforts to attend all three Mass times on Sundays to begin meeting the many music volunteers and parishioners. Recruitment advertising for the 11 AM Choir was delivered to the church, university, and Regina Catholic Schools via email, bulletin, posters, announcements, word of mouth, and inperson meetings throughout August and September. I was even fortunate enough to be welcomed for visits (and sometimes rehearsals) in people's homes on some occasions! **Our regular weekly choir for the 11 AM Mass still needs to build new membership in all areas, particularly men's voices. Please strongly consider how you can sing or play with us if you have a gift for music that you may not be using currently! All levels of experience are welcome! If you know someone musical, maybe the nudge they need from the Holy Spirit could come through you!** Holy Rosary Music Ministry offers a wide array of musical traditions and styles; chant, classical, contemporary, or multicultural music can be heard throughout Mass times on Sundays. As we continue to know, love, and serve the Lord through music, let us be thankful and mindful of the blessings of our diversity. Let us seek to engage with and encourage musicians & volunteers among Holy Rosary Cathedral parishioners, for the present & the future.

The search for candidates to take on the role of church organist also concluded during the Summer, but with a non-typical result. Regina had several talented organists that could assist us, and it was most appealing for them to share their work on the organ with each other in a flexible schedule. Holy Rosary's first-ever Organist Rota was then conceived! As the music director, I work with each organist to set the schedule and select the music you hear each week. We welcomed the talented Barbara Zerr as a regular organist throughout the Summer. By Fall, a rotation was established between Barbara Zerr and two other organists whose musical talents were already part of our parish family, Bernadette Kutarna and Andrew Polasek (a former Organ Scholar). Each of our organists spends multiple hours preparing liturgical music as well as the many beautiful preludes and postludes that leave us marveling at their technical facility on such a vast instrument. They are all to be commended for their thorough care and preparation of Mass music.

Our 2021-2022 Organ Scholar position was awarded to Jessica (Jessy) Stroeder. Jessy is well on her way to becoming a very fine church organist and has proved an exceptional scholar thus far. She has played for a wedding, learned all our Mass parts, and already played an entire service herself! She will continue to play for us and explore some choral conducting of our choir and organists into the Spring of 2022. Our organ scholar program is available to two scholars, and unfortunately, our 2nd position has remained vacant. Piano students that are good at practicing independently and have reached an approximate Grade 8 level in piano are ideal candidates for organ lessons. A slightly younger student or anyone with a lower piano level interested in playing the organ should be encouraged to enroll in organ lessons and eventually enter the scholar program. We do not offer organ lessons through the Cathedral, but we are in contact with many experienced teachers currently training our organ scholars and organists. Please let us know if you would like more information on becoming an organist, and we can point you in the right direction!

As the Summer of 2021 ended, Covid 19 Restrictions were easing across the province, with higher vaccine rates and lower-case rates recorded. The choir was able to return to rehearsals in September. On Sept 15th, 2021, I hosted a Music Ministry Open House to thank, meet, and socialize with all music volunteers at all Mass times and encourage our musicians to come and sing together in a joint choir for Christmas and Easter liturgies. September also brought our hosting the Archdiocese of Regina's first Mass to celebrate the launch of Pope Francis' path to the "Synod on Synodality" in 2023, with music being led by co-cantors, April Polasek and myself, and Barbara Zerr on organ.

2021 culminated with a delightful end to Advent and launched into the Christmas Season with a joint choir for Midnight Mass. Over 35 music ministry members from across our Sunday Mass times came together on Christmas Eve. The Cathedral was filled with joyful chant, choral singing, classically trained vocal solos, organ solos, guitars, piano, and most importantly – energetic and prayerful participation through song from the many people who attended! The Archdiocese of Regina continues to support the participation at Mass for the sick and vulnerable throughout the pandemic, so we were also joined virtually by the thousand viewers (YES! Over a thousand!) on Livestream recording posted to YouTube, thanks to the efforts of the video production team from the Archdiocese. We are looking forward to our next opportunity to come together, and plans for Holy Week 2022 are underway.

I have enjoyed working with many people working so hard to create beautiful music for our worship at the Cathedral. To the choir members of Holy Rosary, I cannot express enough how grateful I am for your dedication, willingness, and kindness. You have welcomed me with open arms, and I look forward to facing musical challenges together in the time to come!

Ecumenical Report for the Annual General Meeting March 2022

2022 began with the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity, which we could not celebrate in our usual way because of the continuation of the Covid pandemic restrictions on gatherings. However, this annual event was well covered by zoom meetings from the Ecumenical Commission for Saskatoon. In particular, the Bible Study entitled "Abide in My Love" (reflections on the words of Jesus in St. John's Gospel 6:9-11) was well worthwhile.

This month, a series of Ecumenical Stewardship webinars are planned under the heading of Sacred Spaces. – topics covered include the use of sacred buildings and properties in new ways. Titles include "From Maintenance to Mission," Sharing Sacred Spaces – facilities and ministries," and "Loving our Neighbours." This should be an interesting series of talks.

I had almost finished this report when war broke out in Ukraine. Because I participate in ecumenical activities here in Regina, I know much more about Ukraine than I would have otherwise. I have attended two church services led by Ukrainian Catholics in the past few years. I also heard Bishop Bayda from Saskatoon speak at a conference in 2015 at St. Basil's Church, where representatives of the Ecumenical Commission were made very welcome.

I was delighted to learn that Lakeview United Church here in Regina has organized a Multi-Faith Prayer Vigil, both in-person and online, for the people of Ukraine on March 10.

Hopefully, due to the provincial lifting of most restrictions for gatherings here in Saskatchewan, I will have much more to report at next year's AGM.
